THAILAND

Thailand is a Southeast Asian country. It's known for tropical beaches, opulent royal palaces, ancient ruins and ornate temples displaying figures of Buddha. In Bangkok, the capital, an ultramodern cityscape rises next to quiet Canalside communities and the iconic temples of Wat Arun, Wat Pho and the Emerald Buddha Temple (Wat Phra Kaew). Nearby beach resorts include bustling Pattaya and fashionable Hua Hin. Thailand is a multi-ethnic nation with a population of 64.1 million and the climate ranges from the sub-tropical to the tropical zones, with three distinct seasons: a hot and dry season Feb to May, a monsoon season from June to Oct, and a cooler, dry season from Nov to Jan.


BANGKOK

Bangkok, Thailand's capital, is known for ornate shrines and vibrant street life. The boat-filled Chao Phraya River feeds its network of canals, flowing past the Rattanakosin royal district, home to opulent Grand Palace.



CHIANG MAI

Chiang Mai lies in mountainous northern Thailand. Founded in 1296, it was capital of the independent Lanna Kingdom until 1558. Its Old City area still retains vestiges of walls and moats from its history as a cultural and religious centre. It's also home to hundreds of elaborate Buddhist temples.

Worthwhile Attractions in Bangkok to Explore



The Grand Palace

The Grand Palace more than lives up to its name. The white exterior walls keep the priceless relics hidden from the public, but upon paying the entrance fee, visitors are treated to views of towering spires and stunning temples across the grounds. A second must-see inside the palace walls is Wat Phra Kaew, otherwise known as the Temple of the Emerald Buddha. Inside, a smallish emerald and gold-laden Buddha dons a cloak that the king changes with the passing of each season.

Wat Pho

Nothing can quite prepare you for the jaw-dropping size of the Reclining Buddha, so try to act natural upon entry. Wat Pho, or the Temple of the Reclining Buddha, surrounds the 46-metre-long (151-foot-long), 15-metre-high (49-foot-high) statue that stares up at the ceiling in a gaze of enlightenment. Though the statue is the focal point of the temple grounds, visitors will also find colourful murals illustrating over 400 images of the Buddha, in addition to a traditional Thai massage school.



Chatuchak Market

Overwhelming to say the least, the Chatuchak Weekend Market is one of the biggest flea markets in the world where you can buy (almost) anything if you know where to look. Everything from rare art pieces and northern handicrafts to kitchenware and genitalia-shaped soap can be found in the nooks and crannies of this claustrophobic space. If crowds aren't your thing, you should visit first thing in the morning when it's easier to manoeuvre through the aisles.

Wat Arun

Recently renovated and reopened to the public at the end of 2017, Wat Arun, or the Temple of the Dawn, is a majestic white temple that sits on the western banks of the Chao Phraya River in the old capital of Thonburi. The temple is home to five towering prangs (towers), which are visible from the river and covered with vibrant porcelain and colourful ceramic tiles, many of which look like pieces of foliage. Like most major attractions, it's best to go when it opens to avoid the crowds.



The Jim Thompson Museum

The Jim Thompson House Museum comprises six traditional Thai teak homes that once belonged to American entrepreneur Jim Thompson, who is credited with making Thai silk famous around the world.

Bangkok National Museum

Lovers of Thai art and culture can spend hours gawking at the treasures inside the Bangkok National Museum. Home to one of the most enticing Asian art collections, the museum also features Neolithic artefacts, religious works and regional crafts.



What's on Offer in Chiang Mai



In the heart of Northern Thailand is the city of Chiang Mai. While Chiang Mai is a big city, and has a diverse population, it still retains plenty of pristine wilderness and gorgeous scenery. That's why Chiang Mai is often known as the Rose of the North. Though often used as a base to explore the surround region, those who visit Chiang Mai will also be able to tour incredible ancient temples, spot elephants in the wild, explore the local culinary landscape and even shop at bustling night markets.

Wat Umong

There is no shortage of spectacular temples in Chiang Mai, but Wat Umong stands out as one of the most interesting. At more than 700 years old, Wat Umong was supposedly built for a monk with a reputation for taking long walks in the forest. To keep the mad monk from wandering off several maze-like tunnels were constructed. The temple is outside of the city, giving it a more secluded feel. Also worth noting is the grand stupa at the entrance of Wat Umong and the scenic ponds where visitors can feed the turtles.

Wat Phan Tao

The enormous Wat Phan Tao is made entirely from wood, with gorgeous teak panels being the highlight of this architectural structure. Located within the walled center of the city of Chiang Mai, Wat Phan Tao is elegant and detailed. The roof boasts golden finials meant to represent snakes, the Lanna flower motif is repeatedly carved into the teak facade and large, sturdy wooden posts support the equally impressive wooden beams overhead. At the back there is a pond and a Buddha statue underneath a Bodhi tree.

Royal Park Rajapruek

Rajapruek, or Ratchaphruek, is the name of Thailand's national flower. It boasts small but vibrant yellow blossoms, and it is sometimes known as the golden shower tree. The Royal Park Rajapruek is named for these gorgeous blooms, and it is a public space where visitors can admire a stunning collection of gardens and ponds. The park is large, but there are trams that can shuttle visitors around the park to see as much of the space as possible.

Elephant Nature Park

Chiang Mai is known for its elephants, but not all elephant attractions have the best interests of the animals at hearts. For animal lovers, there is a perfect solution: The Elephant Nature Park. Located north of the city, the Elephant Nature Park is a sanctuary for rescued elephants.

Chiang Mai Night Bazar

There is no shortage of fantastic markets in Chiang Mai, but the Night Bazaar is by far the most famous. Not surprisingly, it is also one of the most popular tourist attractions in Chiang Mai. As the sun begins to set, the Night Bazaar comes to life. It is open from about 6 pm each evening until midnight, filled with all sorts of smell, tastes and hundreds of bargains. Ideal for souvenir shopping.
