

Ferndale

About

Mount Baker (background picture), an active volcano dominates the Ferndale skyline. It last erupted 6,700 years ago. On cold and clear days you can see the steam raising from its crater.

Ferndale can be traced back to its roots from the Lummi Tribe who called the land “Te-tas-um,” which meant, “the crossing place above Lummi.” Today the Lummi (the 3rd largest tribe in Washington state) is a self-governing Nation and is a nationally recognised leader in tribal self-governance and education. The Lummi tribe express their language, family heritage and religious traditions through their totem pole carvings. Lummi totem poles can be seen today throughout the city.

Ferndale was originally called “Jam”, due to the massive $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile log jam on the Nooksack River, until it was cleared in the latter part of the 19th century. The name Ferndale came from the ferns that grew around the original school house.

To get you in the mood of the start to an incredible journey, we suggest you meander your way to “Chickanut Drive” (route 11). It is the only place where the Cascade Mountains meet the sea, overlooking Samish Bay. The scenery on the 24-mile cliff-hugging byway will literally take your breath away and there are stops on the route, enabling you to immerse yourself in this majestic scenery.

Pioneer Park in Ferndale is the world’s largest Collection of authentic cedar slab log cabins, stretching the Nooksack River.



Attractions

Tennant Lake & Hoyander Homestead

Sit on a 624-acre site, Tennant Lake is surrounded by forest, wetlands and fields. There is a 50ft viewing tower and an elevated boardwalk that winds its way through the swamp and marsh habitat. The Hoyander Homestead Trail is a half-mile trek to Homestead Park, a great insight into the days of pioneer farming so long ago. The kids will love the barn and farmyard animals.

Ferndale’s Sardis Raptor Centre

Specialising in the rehabilitation of Birds of Prey, the centre has played a very important role in treating thousands of birds such as eagles, falcons, hawks and owls. As well as providing care for injured birds, they also make it their mission to rehabilitate endangered species back into the wild. The tour offers an educational insight called “Hunters of the Sky”, where you can learn how these magnificent creatures contribute to the country’s ecosystem.



There are 2 routes you can take to reach Elwha Dam area, where the RV Park is located. One is to take the ferry from Edmonds to Kingston (cost \$62 to \$93 for RVs 40-50ft, cars are \$12-\$15 and bikes \$7), passenger fares are \$8.65 Adult and \$4.30 Children. You will also cross the Hood Canal Bridge. The total drive is only 163 miles (263km), but takes around 3-hrs, 45-mins).

The other way is by road which is around 368-miles (592km) which is approximately a 6-hour drive.

Back in 2011, The dam on Elwha River was removed, in line with the Fisheries Restoration Act, to restore the altered Ecosystem. Within 3-years salmon began to migrate upriver past the old dam. The Elwha River's final 5-miles of its 45-mile length, lies within Olympic National Park

The Elwha Dam area has access to the discovery trail is just up the road, and only 5 minutes away from where the Elwha meets the straight of Juan De Fuca. The beach, the rolling of the waves, and the surfing give a unique ocean experience. The areas to visit are too numerous to list, but some of the most popular are: Hurricane Ridge, Lake Crescent - Sol Duc Hot Springs, Hoh Rain Forest, Olympic National Park, Elwha River, Pacific Beaches and Cape Flattery

The Sol Duc Valley has towering trees, cascading waterways (background picture), with stunning views of the snow-capped mountains in the distance. Definitely worth the hike up the trail, only a short distance from the RV Park.



Attractions

Lake Crescent & Sol Duc Area

Lake Crescent is a crystal clear 12-mile long lake located 17 miles west of Port Angeles on Highway 101. The glacier-carved lake offers swimming, boating and fishing.

Marymere Falls

A mostly flat one mile hike from Storm King Ranger Station. This walk takes you through the forest of moss covered trees and large ferns.

Sol Duc Falls

A must see! The trail head is located a short drive past the resort and camp grounds. Several trails take off from the Sol Duc Falls Trail taking you up into the Seven Lakes Basin.

Hurricane Ridge

The most popular access to Olympic National Park, a paved road twists and turns 17 miles up a steep 7 percent grade to the mile-high summit, where, on a clear day, with breath-taking 360-degree views of mountain, valley, and sea.

About

The next leg of your journey is a ferry crossing from Port Angeles to Victoria, British Columbia, so you will need to ensure you bring your passports. The ferry, a 90-minute sailing, cost is \$67 for acvehicle under 18ft and \$5.25 per ft thereafter. Adult fare is \$19.50 and \$9.75 for kids under 11-years old, kids under 4 go free.

Victoria was established as Fort Victoria in 1843 by the Hudson's Bay Fur Trading Company and was incorporated as a city in 1862.

Victoria is internationally know as the “City of Gardens”, due to its perfect growing climate. There are over 3.4b blloms across the city. As the country’s most friendly bicycle city, you may wish to hire bikes to go around.

Beacon Hill Park is home to the world’s tallest totem pole. The waters are home to three pods of orca (killer) whales, totalling 76.

Victoria’s Chinatown is the oldet in the country and Fan Tan Alley is the narrowest street in the nation.

The city’s Indigenous Peoples Heritage is a must see; there are dances, masks, ceremonies, potlaches and art to be admired. Check out the Royal BC Museum.

The city’s downtown rich historical past can be seen in its many squares, alleys and important landmarks.



Attractions

Craigdarroch Castle

During the reign of Queen Victoria, the castle was built by coal baron Robert Dunsmuir and has been meticulously restored to its 1890s glory. The Castle weaves a fascinating tale of this intriguing family – their achievements, their relationships and even their quirks.

Beacon Hill Park

Victoria’s crown jewel of all of its parks, sits on 200-acres., featuring an abundance of natural attractions. Beacon Hill is sacred to the Lekwungen People (now known as Esquimalt Nation and Songhees Nation)., spanning thousands of years.

Royal BC Museum

One of the most visited and voted No.1 in Canada, the museum allows you to discover things and people you never knew. Totems, masks and cultural treasures can be viewed in the world-class First Peoples Gallery. Authentic artifacts and highly realistic settings -- from the Woolly Mammoth in his rocky, icy world to a tar-scented trip on the HMS Discovery.




Spinnakers Castro Brewpub

Vancouver

Located on the southwest corner of British Columbia, Vancouver was once home to an indigenous settlement some 3,000 years ago, called Xwmétkwyiem. Its name today, comes from the British Naval Captain George Vancouver who was the first European to venture on Canada's Pacific coast in 1792. The Marine Building on 355 Burrard Street used to be the tallest building in the British Empire.

The city today is renowned as one of the best places to live in the world.

Its amazing scenic views, mild climate and friendly people make it a very popular tourist destination. The city has the 4th largest cruise terminal in the world, all heading towards Alaska.

Vancouver also has Canada's longest salt water pool "Kitsilano Beach Park", stretching 137-metres.

If you are looking for some nice walking trails in the heart of the city, Stanley Park is the perfect choice. The park (Vancouver's largest), is around 10% bigger than Central Park in New York. Its also home to some of Vancouver's most famous landmarks including Second Beach, Siwash Rock, the Stanley Park Seawall and Prospect Point.

Greenpeace, one of the world's most successful environmental groups, was founded in Vancouver 1971. A group of volunteers first met in Gastown's Luna Café, now known as Smart Mouth Cafe.



Attractions

Vancouver Aquarium

Ranked in the top 5 worldwide, the Vancouver Aquarium is home to thousands of incredible ocean species and amazing aquatic life. It's also Ocean Wise headquarters, where our scientists, educators and conservation experts do their work.

Capilano Suspension Bridge


Located in North Vancouver (around 10-minutes drive from the RV Park), this swaying suspension bridge stretches 450ft (137m) across a canyon and the Capilano River which lays 239ft (70m) below. There is also the treetop adventure on 7 suspension bridges up 100ft high and a glassed-platformed Cliff Walk.

Britannia Mine Museum

An immersive historical experience, just 45 minutes north of Vancouver. The Museum offers guided underground tours to self-led exploration of the social history of Britannia Beach.



Lillooet

About

Lillooet is the hidden gem of British Columbia. From stunning mountain vistas to incredible lakes, this jade capital town of Canada is home to the largest salmon spawning river in the world, the "Fraser River".

Lillooet's international reputation for jade production is on display can be seen in many spots along Main Street. The town is synonymous with the "Gold Rush" era. In 1858, thousands once travelled up the Harrison, Lillooet, Anderson and Seton lakes to the present site. Hydroelectricity, forestry and tourism dominate the economy today.

The mountains that skirts Tyaughton Lake and rise to around 3,000ft, are home to Mountain Goats, big horn sheep, cougar, and black bears.

Entrenched in a canyon between Lillooet and Cache Creek is Pavilion Lake, which contains mysterious underwater formations of coral-like structures, some of which are up to four metres high, up to 11,000 years old, and covered in mats of microscopic, sunlight-loving microbes. NASA scientists from, Simon Fraser University and Portland State University believe that the massive cannot be found anywhere else in the world.

Lillooet has a pleasant climate, with many trails to explore, making it the idyllic place for hikers and bike riders.



Attractions

Kaoham Shuttle

Described as one of the most spectacular rail trips in the world, this small train first travels from Lillooet through the narrow Seton River canyon, then along the scenic northwest shoreline of 24.3 kilometre-long Seton Lake, a long, fjord-like finger of glacial jade-green water.

Seton Lake

Just a few kilometres to the west of Lillooet (on Hwy 99) is the Seton Lake Recreational Area. The viewpoint is an amazing place to take photos of the stunning Seton Lake. The emerald green lake is 22 kilometres long and estimated to be 500 metres deep. Here you can hire canoes, boats, hike, swim or just have a picnic and immerse yourself in the true splendour of this awe inspiring place.

Pavilion Lake

If you happen to have a scuba diving license, lying 22-metres (70ft) below the surface is the 11,000 year strange microbialite structures. The lake has crystal clear vision, well worth a visit.

Cayoosh Creek Campground is located only 900 metres from downtown Lillooet. It is a Municipal RV site, which is nice and peaceful with great views of the mountains.

The natural landscapes are only a short walk, where you can take wonderful pictures. This is a great campsite for families.

There is a grocery and liquor store nearby should you wish to buy some essentials.

Nearby attractions are Seton Lake (2.8-miles), Lillooet Museum and Visitor Centre (1.2-miles), and the Old Suspension Bridge (2.3-miles).

Cayoosh Creek Campground

About

Lillooet to Clearwater is approximately 182-miles (294km) which take around 3-hours and 20-minutes drive.

Clearwater is a district municipality in the North Thompson River valley in British Columbia, Canada, where the Clearwater River empties into the North Thompson River. It is a wilderness outpost and your gateway to Wells Gray Park.

The mountain communities centred around Clearwater and Wells Gray Provincial Park, with just over 5,000sq km of alpine wilderness, borne from volcanoes and carved by glaciers. It's one of the most unique landscapes in all of British Columbia., where you can hike, go wildlife spotting and visit amazing waterfalls.

As a base to stay we selected Dutch Lake due to its setting on the waters edge and water activities. If you are into waterfalls there is Spahats Falls (around 10km). The falls which sit at a height of 75m (246ft) rush through a gap in the canyon wall and provide incredible views only a short distance from the parking lot. There is also Helmcken Falls which tower 141m (463ft), regarded by many as the centre piece of Wells Gray. Helmcken is around 42km from Dutch Lake but well worth the trip if you like waterfalls.

Wells Gray Provincial Park is a 520,000 hectare area of glorious wilderness to be explored.

Attractions

Clearwater Lake Boat Tour

Clearwater Lake is a Glacial fed lake that remain cold year round. You will get to see the most spectacular untouched wilderness scenery in the world. The rainforest lines the shore of the lakes and if the timing is good you may see bear, moose, deer, pine martin and squirrels. Caribou and deer are sometimes spotted swimming across the Lake. Bald Eagle and Osprey can be seen on the lake.

Whitewater rafting

The Clearwater River runs through Wells Gray Provincial Park. it's the route most of the adventures take place. The river alone is something to behold, described as one of the most spectacular tributaries of the Fraser system, forceful and churning at one bend, graceful and yielding at another.

Jasper National Park

Dutch Lake, Clearwater to Jasper National Park is approximately 200-miles (323km), which takes a drive of around 3-hours, 30-minutes.


Jasper National Park extends over 11,000 square kilometres, it's the largest national park in the Canadian Rockies and part of UNESCO's Canadian Rocky Mountain Parks World Heritage Site.

We chose a municipal RV site close to Jasper, a small mountain town as a base to explore the National Park.

The park is home to caribou, elk, moose, mountain goats, bighorn sheep, bears and wolves.

There are many lakes formed from the Glaciers, the largest of which is Maligne Lake, you may want to relax and take a cruise to Spirit Island. The island is a spiritual place for the Stoney Nakoda First Nation, who believe mountains are physical representations of their ancestors.

If you would like to experience the majesty of the Rockies, and don't mind travelling for an hour, the "Columbia Icefield Skywalk" is a great place to see the 10,000 year old "Athabasca Glacier". As you step out to the cliffs edge (280m (918ft drop), you will connect with the Canadian Rockies in a deep, meaningful and unforgettable way. The walk is presented in an interpretive storytelling format, quite mind-blowing!



Attractions

Athabasca Falls

Located around 17-mile (28km) from the RV Campground or slightly longer to Jasper town, just under 30-minutes drive. A great family-friendly easy hike to see one of the most powerful and spectacular waterfalls in Jasper as well as get great views along the Athabasca River. The falls span a height of 75ft (23m).

Maligne Lake

The largest lake in the Rockies, spanning 22km long. A great place for watersports except for swimming as its too cold. Hiking, biking, horseback riding, wildlife viewing and more.

Jasper Skytram

Located just 4-miles (6.6km) from the Watipi Campground and just slightly more from Jasper town, you will find the areas top attraction. This is the longest and highest aerial tramway in the Rockies! A seven-minute ride to the top of Whistler's Mountain, taking in the breath-taking views from the visitor's centre or hike to the summit.

The Mount Robson Inn is a top-rated hotel on Jasper's main street. Enjoy the great location, surrounding mountains, and a really cool town!



The drive from Jasper to Banff takes around 3-hours and forty minutes, a distance of 187-miles (287km).

Banff National Park is a combination of Rocky Mountain peaks, turquoise glacial lakes, a mountain town and village, wildlife and jaw-dropping UNESCO scenic drives. Canada's flagship of the nation's park system, spans 6,641 square kilometres (2,564 square miles), offering a variety of activities including hiking, biking and skiing.

Banff village is a thriving year-round resort town with hotels, restaurants, art galleries, and outdoor adventures. Banff National Park Visitor Centre, located in a mock-Tudor building has everything you need to know about places within the park. While downtown Banff, you may also want to visit The Cascades of Time Gardens, which are a small oasis just minutes walking distance from downtown area, tucked behind the Parks Administrative Office.

A great place to take that unforgettable picture would be at Surprise Corner on Tunnel Mountain Rd, where the sudden view of the Banff Springs Hotel (known as the Castle of the Rockies) comes into view. This iconic view is promoted all over the world.

Not far from downtown Banff, is Whiskey Creek. Here you can learn how in 1980 Grizzly Bears and humans collided. The attacks made news around the world with stories such as "Banff Under Siege". There was a great book written about the incidents by Sid Marty "The Black Grizzly of Whiskey Creek". It's a gripping read!

Attractions

Banff Hot Springs


A great way to ease your aching muscles from all that hiking. The rich mineral based water is geothermally heated from 3km (1.8-miles) into the earth's crust. Located just 4km (2.5-miles) from Banff town, the springs contain a large pool, café, swimsuits, towels and lockers.

Whyte Museum of the Canadian Rockies

If you would like to know the historical story of Banff and the national milestones of the parks, you should visit this museum. From the First Nations regalia and artifacts to the first explorers, exhibits, it's fascinating!

Cave & Basin National Historic Site

A great family Discovery Tour, exploring the impressive historic architecture, bubbling mineral waters, underground cave, interactive programs, exhibits, and a four-screen visual experience revealing national parks and historic sites across Canada. It's only 2.3km (1.5-miles) from downtown Banff.

This facility has electric only at the site (easy access) and showers/bathrooms nearby. Some of the sites have fire pits. There is plenty of firewood onsite.

The mountain views from this site are amazing, however there are some spots that have trees that block your view, so be sure to select wisely. This site is probably the only one that is able to pick up a cell signal within the National Park.

Grocery store is nearby, making life easy to stock up on your necessities if needed.

Glacier National Park is home to the famous Roger's Pass Historic Site. This history of Glacier National Park is linked to two main Canadian transportation routes; the Canadian Pacific Railway, which was completed in 1885 and the Trans-Canada Highway, which was finished in 1963. The quaint museum at Rogers Pass is well worth a visit.

The most popular Park Trails all commence from the Illecillewaet Campground. Here is an insight into some them:

The Hermit Trail (background picture)


A 3km trail up (for the fit), as it gains a steep climb of 870m. Well worth it for the views from the top.

Perley Rock

A challenging 11km round hike, taking in the magnificent scenery of a turquoise lake, forests and waterfalls.

Abbot Ridge

A 6.8km trail, climbing an elevation of 1,029m with views of many iconic features of Glacier National Park.



Attractions

Rogers Pass Discovery Centre

Located at the summit of the pass within Glacier National Park, the centre has theatre exhibits about the discovery of Rogers Pass and the completion of the railway, as well as natural history displays. The location is around 2.5km from the RV Campground.

Canyon Hot Springs

A great mountain location in Albert Canyon situated between Glacier and Mount Revelstoke National Parks. Soak in the hot mineral pools or try exploring the spectacular National Parks surrounding the resort. Its around 32km from Illecillewaet Campground.

There are cabins for hire at this site should you be travelling by car.

There is also an RV site here, if you are not really into hiking, you can always rejuvenate in the hot springs.

Illecillewaet campground is one of the most accessible RV campgrounds in Glacier National Park. It is a basic RV campsite in a stunning location, set along the glacier-fed Illecillewaet River. Be sure to arrive with empty sewerage tanks and charged batteries. There is a generator service provide only between 5-7pm to recharge batteries. There are flushing toilets and portable water. There are also kitchen covered areas with sinks to wash your dishes and plenty of firewood to get your campfire going at night (be sure to get the permit).

With around 60 spaces you can easily find friends to hike with you on 1 of the 9 trails leaving the site (4 pax is a must, due to bears). You may want to bring along some bear repellent just in case.


Penticton is around 207-miles (333km) from Illecillewaet Campground in Glacier National Park, which take approximately just over 4-hours drive.

Located in the south central region of British Columbia, in an area known as the Okanagan Valley, Penticton is one, of only two cities in the world, situated between two lakes – Okanagan Lake & Skaha Lake. Shimmering blue water, long stretches of sandy beach, vineyards, orchards, gentle mountains and a wide variety of outdoor activities. The city offers plenty of things to do, from hiking or biking the Kettle Valley Trail to skiing Apex Mountain to climbing the Skaha Bluffs.

Penticton is surrounded by scores of vineyards that produce award-winning wines and offers world-renowned chef-inspired menus and tastings. The drive north from Penticton to Naramata along Lake Okanagan offers breath-taking scenery of the vines as they stretch down to the lakeshore.

There are a maize of biking trails such as the Three Blind Mice trail and multiple upgrades over the past few years.

Skaha Bluffs Provincial Park just south of Penticton, is world famous for rock climbing, and one of the best places for climbing in Canada.

SS Sicamous

Floating on a tube or raft down the 4-mile (7km), the channel (also known as the Okanagan River Channel) that connects Skaha Lake to Okanagan Lake is an annual event for many locals. You can do it on your own or you can jump on the Coyote Cruises bus and rent one of their tubes or rafts (Approx \$6 for a tube and \$6 for a bus ride.) Don't forget to bring your sunscreen and drinks because the full tube ride takes between 3 to 4 hours.


Ellensburg, Washington is around 243-miles (390km) from Penticton, BC, which take around 4-hours and 38-minutes drive.



Mount St. Helens

Washington

About

The distance from Ellensburg to Mount St. Helens is around 134-miles (217km) which takes approximately 2-hours and forty-five minutes.

Mount St. Helens is the most active volcano in the Cascade Range. On May 18, 1980, after experiencing a couple of months of earthquake activity and weak volcanic flare-ups, Mount St. Helens erupted violently, decimating everything in its path.

It claimed more than 50 lives and destroyed thousands of acres of land, wiping out the entire animal and plant communities. A huge ash cloud darkened the skies for hundreds of miles and dramatically changed the mountain scape as well as its surrounding areas. Geologists believe the visible cone at the top was formed 2,200 years. Recently (April 2020), small earthquakes were located at Mount St. Helens, consistent with normal seismicity levels. The volcano today is closely monitored by satellite in order to detect an early volcanic activity.

In 1982 Mount St. Helens was established as a National Volcanic Monument, under control of the U.S. Forest Service. In 2009 the process began to transition Mount St. Helens to National Park Status, which is still ongoing.



Attractions

Yale Reservoir

Less than one mile from the campground, on the North Fork Lewis River. Shallow fishing for kokanee is best in the spring and fall; in the summer months deep fishing is the best method. Coastal Cutthroat Trout can be caught near the mouth of Siouxon Creek.

Ape Caves

The third longest lava tube in North America, formed more than 2,000 years ago, and discovered 1947 by a logger named Lawrence Johnson. There are two entrances: Lower Cave Section (shorter and easier route) and the Upper Cave (longer and more difficult route).

Mount St. Helens Volcano Hike

The most spectacular 10-mile hike trail system in the Mount St. Helens area. Starting from Johnson Ridge Observatory winds through the heart of the blast zone in the Mount Margaret Backcountry, past Coldwater Peak, and along south Coldwater Ridge. You'll see spectacular wildflower displays, stunning views of St. Helens Lake and Spirit Lake, and twisted logging equipment: all reminders of the destructive and renewing powers of this great volcano.


This mountain town has impressive views of the Cascade Range and is an outdoor enthusiasts hub. There are 30 over craft breweries, 63 miles of urban trails including the Deschutes River Trail, 300 miles of single-track trails and more than 80 parks.

Access to Alpine Lakes and Mount. Bachelor (the country's 6th largest ski area), open for all-season fun, including downhill mountain biking, just a short drive up the Cascade Lakes Scenic Byway.

Farewell Bend (background picture) is one of the city's most popular parks located right along the Deschutes River. There is a trail that runs the length of the park, connecting to the Old Mill District to the northeast.

The Old Mill District was once home to two of the largest ponderosa pine sawmill operations. Now it boasts more than 55 restaurants, shops, art galleries and boutique fitness studios nestled alongside the Deschutes River.

You may want to visit Tumalo falls (around 13-miles from Downtown Bend), a great place for hiking and mountain bike trails. The Falls is a 97-foot (30 m) waterfall on Tumalo Creek. Additional waterfalls are upstream along Tumalo Creek and a tributary, Bridge Creek and its Bridge Creek Falls. All of these falls are within the Deschutes National Forest.



Attractions

Lava River Cave

Located in the Newberry Volcanic Monument is a mile-long lava tube. The self-guided exploration takes approximately 1.5 hours to tour the entire cave. Initial access descends 150 stairs to an uneven floor and can be challenging. The Average temperature in the Cave is 42 degrees Fahrenheit.

Bend Ale Trail

Craft beer is an integral part of Bend's culture and history. Even you're not a beer fan, you'll be fascinated by the science lesson you get on a brewery tour. Almost all the breweries along the Bend Ale Trail are family-friendly, so you can make it a casual lunch with the kids. Most of the breweries offer taster trays, so seize the opportunity to try.

Drive the Cascade Lakes Scenic Byway

One of the most scenic drives in all of Oregon. The drive is 66 miles in length and takes around 3-5 hours, depending on how often you stop. There are countless viewpoints along the way and lakes that are too beautiful to pass by.

Crater Lake National Park

Oregon

About

The drive from Bend to Crater Lake National Park takes just over 2-hours at a distance of 115-miles (185km).

With a depth of 1,943 ft (592m), Crater Lake is the deepest lake in the United States and one of the most beautiful. The water's intense blue colour is an indication of its great depth and purity. Surrounded by cliffs, the lake is fed entirely by rain and snow. Scientists consider Crater Lake to be the cleanest and clearest large body of water in the world.

The Lake rests in the belly of a dormant volcano which once stood 12,000 ft (3,658m) tall, but collapsed due to a major eruption 7,700 years ago. Eruptions that occurred later formed Wizard Island, a cinder cone that rises from the water. The park also has a second rocky island, the Phantom Ship.

Crater Lake occupies just under 10% of the National Park and is surrounded by old-growth forests that blanket the landscape. There are 15 species of conifers, from towering ponderosa pines to ancient whitebark pines, all which shelter a wide array of wildlife, including black bears, mountain lions, elk, and spotted owls.

There are two Visitors Centres, Steel Visitor Centre, which offers a 22-minute film, shown every half hour, that explores the park's significance and the lake's volcanic past. and Rim Visitor Centre.

Attractions

Mount Scott Trail

The highest point in the National Park, this 4.2-mile (6.8km) hike allows you to see lots of wonderful wild flowers and at the peak, stunning views of Crater Lake below.

Rim Drive

A 33-miles (53km) drive around the rim of Crater Lake. The contours of the road were designed to compliment the natural landscape. There are many places to stop with ample parking for observing the natural beauty of the lake from different angles. You may want to bring a picnic basket as there are five picnic areas. Traffic goes both directions.

Crater Lake Cruise

Circling the perimeter of the lake, this 2-hour cruise takes in up-close views of Wizard Island, Phantom Ship, and other natural formations. A ranger on board shares information about the lake's history, geology, and culture.

Diamond Lake Resort has evolved from a small fishing lodge built in the 1920s, to a modern family resort. It is a favourite summer spot for fishing (rainbow trout), hiking, bicycling, and horseback riding.

Being the closest RV Park to the lake, you have the opportunity to do swim, rent boats, paddle boats kayaking, and more.

Redwood National Park

About

The drive from Crater National Park to Redwood National Park takes around 4 and a half hours, a distance of 223-miles (359km).

Home to the tallest trees on earth, Redwood National Park's forests, hills, rivers support a rich mosaic of life, including elk, whales, seals and seasonal flowers. Some trees are 370 feet (113 meters) in height, which is five stories taller than the Statue of Liberty. The park also features spectacular giant sequoia trees. In fact, the Park contains three of the largest trees in the world.

Taking root for thousands of years, the Redwoods are one of Earth's most magnificent and enduring creations of nature, some as old as the Roman Empire. These incredible specimens of our world can live up to 2,000 years. Get to see them up close as you walk, bike, camp or horseback ride along 200 miles of trails in the park system.

The Park preserves 37 miles of northern California pristine coastal lands. These trees are believed to live no further inland from the sea than the fog's reach, around 30 miles. The dense fogs of summer play a vital role in keeping these forests saturated, one of the key factors to their astonishing height.

Native Americans grazed and hunted on these lands for 3,000 years, many of which still remain today. Archaeological evidence discovered in Redwoods, the Tolowa, Yurok, Chilula, Wiyot, and Karok all have strong historical ties to the region, but the Yurok apparently outnumbered other tribes.

Attractions

Tall Trees Grove

Best known for the "Libbey Tree", the world's tallest known living thing. Although there are taller Redwoods, this is the only one you can physically see. Free permits must be obtained from the nearby park's visitor centre.

Avenue of the Giants

The 31-mile road is one of the best stretches of highway in the state. One of the most awe-inspiring drives of nothing but sheer beauty as you pass through it. The greens, browns, and yellows will blow you away as you curve around the windy State Route 254. If you have not driven this road then you must add it to your bucket list, it is one of the best places in California.


Fern Canyon

Shooting up from a creek, the canyon walls are 50 feet high in places and completely covered in ferns and mosses, some of which are species dating back hundreds of millions of years.

It feels like you're walking through Jurassic Park (actually part of *The Lost World: Jurassic Park* was shot here). If you are lucky, you might even spot a giant salamander! Fern Canyon is located in Prairie Creek Redwoods State Park.



The drive from Redwood National Park to Fort Bragg is around 3-hours and forty minutes, a distance of 181-miles (291km).


The Mendocino National Park is one of California's 18 national forests not crossed by a paved road or highway, a truly magnificent outdoor experience of tranquillity and solitude.

Comprising of one million acres, the forest is 65-miles (105km) in length and 35-miles (57km) across. Here you will find mountains and canyons which offer a variety of recreational opportunities including hiking, backpacking, boating, fishing, hunting, nature study, photography, and off-road vehicle travel.

Thousands of years before pioneers arrived from the eastern United States, five Native American tribes lived off its bounty - the Yuki, Nomlaki Wintu, Patwin Wintu, Eastern Pomo, and Northeastern Pomo.

The Mendocino waters flow to the Pacific Ocean, westward through the Eel River system, and eastward through the Sacramento River system to San Francisco Bay.

There is an abundance of wildlife, black-tailed deer, black bear, mountain lion, bobcat, coyote, skunk, jackrabbits, opossum, badger, gray squirrel, ground squirrel, rattlesnakes, gopher snakes, lizards, toads, pacific tree frog, quail, wild turkey, blue grouse, golden eagle, spotted owl, goshawk, prairie falcon, peregrine falcon, bald eagle, turkey buzzard, scrub jays, woodpeckers and a variety of migratory water and song birds.



Attractions

The Mendocino Coast

Water-carved sea stacks, tide pools, secret coves, occupied by colourful sea stars and anemones, Mendocino's coastline beckons the explorer. Known as 10-miles beach, the wild stretch of rugged, unspoiled coastline, offers visitors outstanding wildlife-watching, thanks to its three preserves and one of California's least developed estuaries. Heading south toward Mendocino, you'll come upon Glass Beach, one of California's most extraordinary finds: polished bits of sea glass fill the beach.

Pillsbury Lake

At one with nature, you can easily lose yourself at Lake Pillsbury, surrounded by forests of massive pine trees, majestic peaks and the crystal-clear waters of this manmade lake. 
The drive from the Mendocino Coast to Bodega Bay is around 2-hours and 40-minutes, a distance of 107-miles (172km).

Bodega Bay is a picturesque fishing village on the Sonoma Coast that harboured from the Pacific Ocean. Bodega Head, a rocky cliff, overlooking the ocean, is perfect for a stroll along the cliffs, watching for migrating whales. These magnificent cetaceans can be spotted of the coast all year long, but chances are best during the primary migrations (October through February, when Gray Whales are moving southbound from Alaska to Mexico, and February through April, when they reverse course).

The coast is great for kayaking, local tours will guide you to secret coves and beaches. There are plenty of fresh seafood restaurants serving fresh oysters and chowders, some with excellent views of the Bay.

Driving just a few miles (around 11-minutes) inland, you'll reach the tiny town of Bodega. This was the setting for Alfred Hitchcock's "The Birds". The hit movie was inspired by an actual attack on the town in the 1950s by shorebirds who were believed to have ingested poisonous toxins.

If you would like to go sailing at get up close to the whales, sea lions, and harbour seals, you can join a boat tour right from the Bay.

Downtown Bodega Alfred Hitchcock's The Birds

Stroll around this one-block town and you'll spot some of the buildings used in the movie, including the famous Potter schoolhouse and the St. Teresa of Avila Church.

Spud Point Crab Co.


